Introducing our Head, Areti Bizior

Areti started as Head at Luckley in September 2020, not long before the country went into its second lockdown. In just two years under her leadership, Luckley is at full capacity with a healthy waiting list. The school has an expanded sport offering and there have been some significant changes to the site, including a new all-weather pitch. We welcomed a fully refurbished boarding house and said goodbye to Luckley's waterlogged war-time bunker. Life at Luckley is good.

Growing up in South Africa to Christian parents, Areti earned a Bachelor of Science degree at the University of South Africa. She worked throughout her studies, taking on technical roles in various industries before securing a position in education. What followed was a Bachelor of Education (hons) and a Postgraduate Certification in Education. Apart from her impressive host of educational, coaching and public speaking credentials, Areti also holds a Brown Belt in Karate.

By the time Areti was working at St George's in Ascot, she was married and settled in the Berkshire countryside, where she could not be happier. "St George's is the most fun I have ever had working," she reminisces. As Head of House, she had the time of her life caring for, entertaining and supporting pupils through the school. She was a natural. Still in touch with her old Head at St George's, Areti fondly refers to Joanna Grant Peterkin as her career mentor. "Joanna always said that one day I would become a Head. At the time, I disagreed." says Areti with a smile. We talk about her seven years at Downe House too, where she accumulated friendships, experience and knowledge. She sights Emma McKendrick, Headmistress of Downe House as a great influence and mentor who taught her the art of achieving excellence.



Fast forward to today and Areti speaks with warmth and enthusiasm about Luckley life. Typically, she meets with staff, prospective parents, pupils and prep school heads. She interviews every child who sits Luckley's entrance exams as well as mentors and manages more than a handful of senior staff. She tours the school twice a week, dines in the evening with our boarders and meets with groups of Sixth Formers at least once a week. Their conversation is inspiring and friendly as Areti has a way of engaging everyone she meets. Outside of school hours Areti plans for Luckley's future, still finding quality time at weekends for her family as well as Sunday church. For this calm, fair and most charming Head, no challenge is too great and her vision for excellence is reflected in all she does. Areti looks forward to many future gatherings with you, our most valued alumni. Should you fancy a visit to school with tea and cake, you would be warmly welcomed.

ALUMNI INTERVIEW

Dancing Through Life with Stephanie Still, Class of 2009



We had the pleasure of catching up with Steph, a Luckley alumni scholar, class of 2009, who returns to talk about life after Luckley and her plans for the future. It is a while since Steph's last school visit as she works abroad at the world class resort of Club La Santa in Lanzarote. Delivering a packed schedule of fitness and aerobic classes each week, Steph is kept on her toes — something she is used to, given she has been dancing since the age of three. Steph is much at home at the resort, having spent a lot of time holidaying at Club La Santa in her younger years. A hotspot for celebrities, she regularly brushes shoulders with the likes of Paralympic champion, Dame Sarah Storey.

Back to see friends and family, she manages to squeeze us in between skiing in France, online sessions with private clients and catching up with her old Luckley friends. Later today she is off to a fitness convention. There is much talk about Steph's love of dance and fitness. She speaks about her time at Farnborough Sixth Form College, where she continued with PE and sport subjects before going onto Bird College to study Dance and Musical Theatre. College had its challenges, often dancing 8am to 7pm. There was also dancing and competing for Tap Attack's Great British Tap Team, which Steph excelled at. Falling very ill while in her second year at Bird College led to her taking leave from college and dance for some time. Against the odds, Steph fought her way back to health with grit and determination (although she likes to think it was her stubborn, non-defeatist character) and completed Bird College with First Class Honours in 2013. We could not be prouder.

Steph went on to tour the Philippines and Malaysia as part of the 'Hello Kitty' live tour. As a tiny dancer and with stiff competition, the Asian tour was a thrilling opportunity. Once back on UK soil, Steph returned to Tap Attack's Great British Tap Team and this time coached them to win the World Championships. Unhappy with the cut-throat nature of the dance industry and the strict criteria to join a dance ensemble, Steph refocused her energy on dance and fitness tuition – completing her Level 2 Exercise to Music and Les Mills body combat courses, qualifying as a body combat instructor. There was independent travel too; to India, Vietnam, Australia, New Zealand and Fiji. Swimming with dolphins and eating fresh tuna in New Zealand were highlights although Steph would like to revisit all these countries again (and more). After travel, came study. Steph completed her Level 3 personal trainer course and continued dance tuition before securing a job at Club La Santa, where she was hired within 24 hours.

Today, Steph is the epitome of good health. This year marks her fifth and last year at Club La Santa before she returns to the UK to continue with a Masters in Clinical Exercise Science at Edinburgh Napier University. Her dream, she says, "Is to split my time between teaching group exercise classes and working with NHS patients, supporting their rehabilitation after illness". During the first lockdown Steph qualified as a Cancer and Exercise Rehabilitation Specialist and then used her spare time to provide online therapy and support to cancer patients. Steph's ability to love and serve is heart-warming.

Steph's lasting memories of Luckley? The strong Luckley community and her very dear friends, as well as the time Mrs Hills rescued a snake from the old swimming pool, now replaced with The Whitty Theatre. She mentions the old Luckley summer uniform, "the ones that just slipped over the head like a bin bag with a zip", says Steph. As someone who was heavily into sports, this was the next best thing to her PE kit and her favourite PE teacher, Mrs May.

Sustainable Luckley

Our Eco Schools Committee and key staff have been working hard to build a more sustainable and environmentally friendly school. Norman, our Bursar monitors Luckley's energy consumption quarterly and we expect the warmer days to increase our efficiency significantly. Emily, our General Services Manager continues to make her way through each classroom with SITA paper recycling bins, with most of the school recycling daily. Our Eco Schools Club has produced signage for each bin to ensure the right rubbish lands in the right place as well as running a two-week school clean up, collecting 10kg of rubbish. Single-use plastic bottles have been replaced with reusable ones around mealtimes and on school trips, while many of our students already bring their own reusable water bottles; now a schoolwide requirement.




