Harriet greets me with a beautiful smile and as always, arrives exactly on time – to the minute! She is bright, bubbly and always an excellent conversationalist. For someone who is always on the go, Harriet is calm and well planned. We talk about her first year at University of Bath, where she is loving life and has already made close friends. This year, Harriet has moved out of the halls of residence and into a shared house in Bath with her university classmates. Outgoing, energetic and helpful, Harriet is right at home with a houseful of people.

As for her studies, Harriet's degree in Criminology is off to a good start. She found her first-year university coursework easier than her A Level studies at Luckley but expects her good luck to change this year. Harriet has wanted to be a police officer since she was just seven years old. Living on the Bright Side of Life

A sunny disposition, pragmatic and diligent; words I would use to describe the lovely Anna Lawler, former Head Student from the class of 2001. Anna works for cloud computing and virtualisation technology company, VMware, having worked her way up to the position of Vice President of Global Partner Marketing. We speak the morning after her return from Palo Alto, California; VMware's company headquarters. It is a business of over 38,000 employees with global revenue of US\$13.4 billion and Anna is in charge of a large global team in locations scattered around the world.

Anna never planned for a 'big career' and when she started at VMware eight years ago, taking on the role of Vice President of Marketing would have seemed unbelievable. Yet, her hard work ethic, focused and steady manner and respectful nature have led her to where she is today. Articulate and straight to the point Anna tells me she feels fortunate to work for a corporate with such strong moral values, and aligned to her own – she is able to dedicate five working days a year to charitable work. Amongst VMware's global clients are a number of charitable organisations, where technology works towards the greater good. Comfortable with the challenges her role brings, she views moving outside her comfort zone as the best way to develop and augment her skillset. Anna shares with me a photo of a talk she gave to a mass audience in California. She enjoys public speaking, which first began here at Luckley. Practice makes perfect rings true.

Anna's path from Luckley to present day was fate and one built on a mix of passion, hard work and strong relationships. She followed her interests, studying History of Art at Leeds University, before spending a summer working as a sailing instructor in Pennsylvania, USA, which she recalls as the best summer ever. Back on UK soil, Anna called on Luckley friend, Juliet Hilton, who helped her find a job with Sage, where she was fortunate to have opportunities in different roles, moving around the business. Desperate to travel, she left Sage in search of adventure and spent six months travelling Asia, Australia, New Zealand and the USA. Anna was re-employed by Sage on her return to the UK and this was the start of her marketing career. She was given big responsibility early on, in charge of delivering S Magazine, Sage's customer magazine. Night school ensured she got the tuition needed, achieving a Chartered Institute of Marketing Diploma (with Merit) and here she met like-minded marketeers; spending many-an-evening exchanging marketing ideas across industries as broad as IT, banking and hospitality.

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LUCKLEY ALUMNI MEMORIES

Sue Bailey (née Pike), Luckley pupil 1972 – 1974



Sue Bailey was schooled at Luckley-Oakfield from 1972 to 1974. In this short time she built lasting memories of Luckley and of life in England, being Canadian and from a military family. She flew back to visit England with her husband, John in June 2019 to join in Luckley's Centenary celebrations. From the memories of Sue Bailey, she shares recollections of Luckley below and her Christmas tree, right, proudly decorated with the inclusion of a Luckley ornament.

"Gym class – how lucky I felt that I was offered a choice of horse riding for gym class! This was unheard of in my part of Canada and so I whole-heartedly chose to be bused to the stable. I had not ridden before and so had to have private lessons at the start. Eventually I joined the group of riders. I was given a horse, Bracken, that had to be at the back of the line as he would kick any horse behind him. I became quite close to Bracken. He sometimes deviated from the pack on the main trail and I would enjoy the side trip and coaxing him back with the others. I have not ridden much since but enrolled my children in summer horse camp when they were young, so they could experience it."

Vera attended the Luckley-Oakfield School Retirement Fellowship (LOSRF) lunch in September. She was delighted to see Luckley doing so well and loved her time working here, recounting the very special community. Before Luckley, she was at Sandhurst for 18 years, a co-educational day school. The move to Luckley was initially an adjustment, not least because of the boarding pupils. Once settled, she remained at Luckley until retirement.

Reading the previous edition of Luckley's alumni newsletter, Vera commented on Luckley's Speech Day in July. She mentioned how good it was to see Jane Tudor in attendance and Laura Buckenham as the annual Speech Day speaker. She recalls Laura sitting in the special head girl's seat at assembly, although Vera did not teach Laura. Laura's younger sister, Andrea, was a great friend of Vera's daughter, Helen. It was thought that Andrea went on to be a teacher and most recently took up a headship at a London school.

Returning to news of Vera's children, she taught both her own daughters; her elder daughter, Sonia, at A Level and younger daughter, and Helen, in the first GCSE cohort. Vera was also their Head of Sixth Form, of course! Vera and her daughters had an entirely professional relationship at school which sometimes amused their friends! Sonia is now a lawyer specialising in asylum and immigration work in London. Helen is a consultant in intervention cardiology and lives in Malvern. Helen has two daughters but Sonia prefers two cats!

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LUCKLEY ALUMNI MEMORIES

Georgina Blight (née Durst), Luckley pupil 1945 – 1949

I met Georgina at her home in Windsor; I came armed with albums of archived photographs that went back to Georgina's time at Luckley, 1945 – 1949. One album was the equivalent of what we now call a 'Leavers Book', showcasing all those Year 11 and Year 13 students leaving that year. However, school life in 1945 was much different than that today. To start, the world was readjusting to normal life, following WWII, although there had been minimal disruption to school life.

Georgina recalls young teachers being drafted into the armed forces before arriving at Luckley; teaching staff were mainly older women. These were strict times and punishment was given for so much as a wrong look. School was challenging, mainly due to her undiagnosed Dyslexia, as there was no such thing in her time. While she was good at Maths, she was singled out for reading and writing and not even her mother could understand her struggles.

Interestingly, after a time in furniture making, Georgina settled into a career teaching. She spent 15 years as a primary school teacher, one year in Washington D.C., before specialising in teaching those with Dyslexia. Her personal experience could be put to good use.

Georgina, like many, boarded at Luckley as her family lived in London. She recalls the older girls sleeping in Garden House. Every year, they delighted in going to Wimbledon to watch the tennis. Often, wealthy ladies would give the girls their tickets to centre court. How fortunate they all were.

She remembers a number of girls from school; Robin Empson, who's parents were diplomats and whom she stayed with many times. Robin and Georgina were always treated to an outing such as the theatre. Susan Hirsch came over with her family after the war; she was Hungarian. Anne Greenwell was a terrific sports person and went on to teach tennis and live abroad six months at a time. Diana Stafford was a good friend, who originated from rural Wales, where Georgina spent much time. Equally, Diana stayed with Georgina in London and the two developed an appreciation for their very different lifestyles. Diana went on to cultivate plants and enjoyed growing and selling a large selection from home.

Supporting Literacy

Supporting the National Literacy Trust, Luckley's English department organised a day-long fundraising event, raising money to support young people and adults in achieving better literacy skills. Literacy is essential to living an independent and successful life yet current research highlights the lowest level of reading enjoyment since 2005 amongst young people aged 5 to 18. We know that low literacy is inextricably linked to poverty and those born into low literacy communities have some of the lowest life expectancies in England.

Luckley leaders, staff and pupils were all inspired to give more young people a better chance of success. It was a busy day with tombola gifts, a lucky dip box, craft sale, cake sale and book swap and sale. The event raised £974.40, exceeding all expectations.

#LanguagesWeek was celebrated widely across Luckley in September. A great British misconception remains, that a foreign language is too difficult to learn, and this belief is passed down through the generations. The Luckley language video highlighted, in the most engaging of ways, that many foreign words appear in the English language today – these are words that are considered modern and 'cool'. Luckley's Acting Head of Modern Foreign Languages, Holly Hinz, suggests that

Loved by pupils and colleagues, I received the very sad news that Valerie had died on Friday, 15 December at QA Hospital, Portsmouth. The news was passed on through friend and colleague, Mrs Pam Creech, who had been to see Valerie in hospital. Valerie was accompanied by her cat, Geronimo, whilst being cared for, which made me smile. A more fitting tribute will follow, once I have more details.

Anne Pauline Hornsey (née Le Grew Harrison) 8 December 1932 – 1 November 2023

Anne's daughter, Sally, was in touch to deliver the news that Anne sadly died, aged 91. She also wanted to know more about her mother's time at Luckley during 1946 and 1947. Supposedly Anne was happy at Luckley and I hope that those who knew Anne can tell us more about her.

Anne was brought up in Suffolk, and went to prep school in Long Melford before moving to Luckley; which catered to her interests in Art and Drama. She discovered a love for dance and went on to the Josephine Bradley School of Dance. Her first husband was in fact, one of her dance pupils as well as an RAF Flight Lieutenant.

The couple had two lovely girls, Sally and Jenny, and spent time living abroad. First for three years in Changi, Singapore and then two years in Port Dickson, Malaysia. There was time back in England and a final year's trip to Africa; stopping in Venice, Cape Town, Mombasa, The Seychelles, Nairobi and Durban. Anne and her family settled back at Kew Gardens, London until her husband died unexpectedly. Gloucestershire was to be the county where Anne re-established herself and her family.

Anne remarried and had a third daughter, Clare, although this union broke down and Anne resorted to an independent life after divorce. She went on to spend 20 years working at Millett's before retiring, as well as hosting international students at her home; enjoying the company. She equally loved her garden and floristry, time with her pets, as well as entertaining her grandchildren.

In later life, Anne overcame breast cancer and heart disease before a diagnosis of Parkinsons. She then moved to live with her daughter, Clare, and her granddaughter, before being moved to Oak Tree Mews care home, following a severe chest infection. It is here that she died, leaving a large loving family behind. Our thoughts and prayers go out to Anne and her family. Like all Luckley's alumni, Anne will be remembered within the School's records, forming part of its long-standing history.

Trevor Craddock was a former Luckley staff member, who worked in the Music Department as a peripatetic teacher and taught many Luckley girls as well as some staff. Sadly, Trevor passed away on 22 June, which was a real shock. In recent years Trevor was diagnosed with Sarcoidosis, which affected his breathing and lungs and was receiving treatment from Papworth Hospital. Former Director of Music, Margaret Vogel, kept in touch with Trevor and spoke to him at the start of 2023 and thought the treatment was going well; with his voice being much clearer. After attending a friend's wedding in May 2023, he contracted a chest infection, which was both viral and bacterial. Treatment in hospital was not enough as his lungs were too weak to fight the Trevor touched the lives of so many; his fellow lay clerks at St George's Chapel Choir, Windsor and his numerous pupils across Luckley and St George's. He will be remembered as a good friend to colleagues, a delightful and charming man with a wonderful bass baritone voice. The news was announced by Chris Gadsby, former Luckley Head of Chemistry teacher 1980 – 2007.

It was October 1957, just when Asian Flu was sweeping the country, that a fundraising dance with 300 guests and a well known London band made a clear profit of £225 – enough to make the much wanted swimming pool a reality. It was nearly 60 years later in 2016, when the swimming pool was replaced by the state-of-the-art Whitty Theatre. As was the swimming pool in its day, the theatre is a great asset to the School and the local community; only made possible by an extraordinary financial gift.

Sustainable Luckley

In October, Luckley's Eco School committee held a non-uniform day to raise money for a non-profit initiative, 'Just One Tree'. Pupils were asked to donate £1 and wear something green or an item of clothing that celebrated the natural world – a flowery top, a t-shirt printed with a favourite animal, for example. For every £1 donated, a tree would be planted in one of the charity's reforestation projects worldwide. Participation meant that 377 trees could take root.

Just One Tree supports reforestation projects in areas severely affected by deforestation, such as Kenya, Madagascar, Mozambique and Brazil. In doing so they have the greatest positive effect on limiting global warming whilst simultaneously alleviating extreme poverty within local communities. Locals are provided with training, agricultural education and a means to earn a sustainable income.
