

YOUR FIRST DAY

On your first day at any school you are likely to feel both excited and a little nervous. You really don't need to be worried as there will be lots of people around to help you to settle in. Your **Form Tutor** will answer any questions you have and will tell you what will be happening and when.

You will also start to get to know the Sixth Form **Year 7 Prefects**. They remember what it is like on the first day and are very excited to be the first pupils to be welcoming you to Luckley.

If you are in Year 7, 8 or 9, you are likely to have been in to school for an 'Induction Day' when you will have been shown around and met others in your year group. During that day you will have taken part in some fun activities to help you to get to know the other pupils and some of the teachers, including those who will be Form Tutors.

At the beginning of September the new pupils will come to school **the day before the rest of the pupils come back**. This gives you another chance to learn your way around school. You will also be given things like your **planner and timetable**, and will be shown which is your **locker**, so that you can start to get organised.

ASSEMBLIES

On Monday mornings Mrs Bizior and the Sixth Form will usually lead assembly; we may sing a song or a hymn, and there is a short talk and a prayer. Sometimes we think about issues affecting all our lives, such as events in the news, anti-bullying, supporting charities and staying safe online. On Thursday mornings you may have a year group assembly or time with your form.

Assembly is also a good time to celebrate the achievements of different people in our community when prizes and certificates are presented. These can be for all sorts of different things, including music and drama exams, gaining lots of credits, doing some particularly good work, being part of a winning sports team and many others.





YOUR FORM TUTOR

When you join Luckley you will be placed in a form group with a teacher assigned as your Form Tutor. Your Tutor is a source of lots of help and advice. To start with they make sure you know where everything is, they explain your timetable to you and help you to organise your time and your belongings.

Your Form Tutor is also there to look out for you and your interests. For instance, if you are having trouble with your homework, they will help you. If need be, they will let all your teachers know you are trying your best, if indeed that is the case.


Your Form Tutor will normally register you in the morning, so you will see them every day. With time, your Form Tutor will get to know you very well and this will help them to make sure you are happy and doing well in school.

YOUR SUBJECT TEACHERS

You need to remember three very important things about your subject teachers:

- 1. They are super enthusiastic about their subject.
- 2. They want to pass on their enthusiasm to you.
- 3. They want you to do well.

The thing they worry about the most is that you understand what they are teaching. They want you to ask questions during the lesson and they will be happy to help you at other times. You will be encouraged to do your best and your subject teachers will help you to believe you can succeed.



HOMEWORK

Homework is an important part of your learning in school. At the beginning of the year you will be given a homework timetable telling you which subjects will be set for which night. In Year 7 and 8 you will only be set regular homework in English, Maths, Science and Modern Foreign Languages. For all other subjects teachers will set project work.

In terms of project work, each term you will be expected to complete;

- at least two projects to level 1
- at least one other project to level 2

In addition to this, scholars must complete their subject project to level three with general academic scholars allowed to pick from any of the projects on offer.

Each project is marked out of 30 and the more projects you do the more marks you will earn. Awards will be given at the end of the year for the pupils with most points.

Your Form Tutor will tell you more about this when you join.






FOOD

All the food you need for the school day is provided and it is very good! Therefore you do not need to bring any food into school. You will be given a snack for morning break and, if you stay for the Enrichment Programme, you will have another snack at tea time.

The food is well-balanced, nutritious and designed for energetic and growing young people. There is plenty of choice, including vegetarian dishes, and the catering staff will help you to make sensible choices to ensure that you have a good balance. If you have any food allergies or intolerances, the catering staff will make sure there is alternative food for you to eat.

Sometimes we have theme days, such as Italian, Spanish or BBQs outside. We have a special menu for Chinese New Year and we enjoy a delicious Christmas dinner together.







DRAMA


On your visits to school you are very likely to have seen The Whitty Theatre, where you can learn about all aspects of the theatre and perform on the stage. In Years 7 to 9 you will take part in class Drama lessons. You may go on to choose Drama as one of your GCSE options, and perhaps carry on studying Drama and Theatre Studies at A Level.

You can also take private Drama lessons and exams, either as an individual or in a small group.

In addition you can join the Drama Club which takes place as part of the Enrichment Programme. These different elements of Drama lead to various productions, so watch out for all the different opportunities to take part.

Drama is a great way to have fun, relax and grow in confidence. If you feel too nervous to perform you may want to help with things like backstage, lighting, sound, costumes and makeup. Or you may like to have a small part in the early days.

Have a go, you may surprise yourself!





EXAMS

Whilst exams can be something of a challenge, they are a part of your life and will be for quite some time to come. You have passed exams in order to gain a place at Luckley so you already know you can be successful. You will take the most important exams, your GCSEs and A Levels at the end of Year 11 and 13, by which time you will be very well prepared.

In Years 7-10 you will do your end of year exams at some point in the summer term. They are designed to find out what you have learnt and to help you set targets so that you can improve, if necessary. You and your teachers will use this information throughout the year to ensure you make good progress.

EXTRA SUPPORT

Sometimes you might find yourself struggling in a subject. Perhaps there is a topic that just refuses to make sense, or you find you have a gap in your knowledge because you have been unwell or not covered it in your previous school. First of all, don't worry, but speak to your subject teacher. Usually they will be able to explain things in a way that makes sense.

Some pupils require a bit more support and there may have been discussions between you, your parents and Mrs Bell. Sometimes your teachers will notice that you need extra support. If this is the case Mrs Bell will contact your parents to make sure you get the help you need for as long as it is necessary.





We have four Houses at Luckley, all named after former Luckley Heads: **Cornish**, **Blake**, **Galloway** and **Randle**.

You will find out which House you are in on your first day in school. Being part of a House encourages teamwork and a healthy competitive spirit. Each House has a House Captain who will lead their teams in a whole host of events, including music, drama and dance competitions, sports events and competitions, such as the House Bake-off, Debating and quiz.

A CULTURE OF MUTUAL RESPECT

At Luckley we enjoy a culture of mutual respect where school is considered a safe place. Pupils thrive in this co-educational environment. The curriculum and activities beyond the curriculum help everyone to establish healthy relationships, both amongst their peers as well as wider areas of the school community. This is especially important when taking part in House activities where the need to collaborate and communicate are essential to your House's success. When you get to school, if you are ever unsure of anything make sure you speak to your Form Tutor. They will be really happy to help out in any way they can.

The School Planner, given to you when you arrive, is also an excellent checklist for information, including timings of lessons and an area to copy your timetable. Your Head of Section will be able to explain in more detail certain rules that we have in place, which are all part of the well-oiled Luckley machine.

Inappropriate behaviour will never be tolerated and both staff and pupils have an excellent understanding of this by adhering to our behaviour and conduct policies.

MOBILE PHONES

Mobile devices must be switched off and put away into lockers by 08:45, where they must remain until 16:00. They must not be kept in blazer pockets. At any other time, if it is necessary to contact parents, pupils should report to the School Office or ask a teacher who will supervise the call. Devices may not be used in lessons.



MICROSOFT SURFACE

You will use your Microsoft Surface regularly in lessons, so you must make sure that you bring it to school fully charged every day.

The School's IT Department is able to assist you with any technical problems that you might encounter with your device.



MAKING FRIENDS

When you first join Luckley it will be important for you to make friends and get to know other people. If it is the beginning of a new year and you are in Year 7, you should remember that others will probably be feeling a bit shy and uncertain too, and this can make people behave in different ways; for example, some people talk a lot when they are nervous, some are very quiet and others can be tearful. You will gradually find out what they are really like when you start having lessons together, doing sport and joining in activities such as choirs, drama club and other enrichment activities. In any group of people you will find others who share your interests and enthusiasms: at the same time it is also good to get to know people from different backgrounds and with different preferences.



Some pupils will join Luckley in Year 9 and although many will have been here since Year 7, everyone will be in new form groups so it is like a new start for all pupils. Luckley is a welcoming school and if you are joining in Year 9, everyone in your year will be pleased to have new people joining as this is an opportunity for new friendships. All of the year group will remember their first days of Year 7 and so they will want to help you to settle in and feel happy in your new school.

If you are joining during the year or in a year group other than 7 or 9, you will be assigned a form and given a 'buddy' who will be there in your early days to show you how everything works. We are all here to help you, so don't be afraid to ask if you are unsure about anything at all. Whenever you join, don't feel that you have to make one special friend straight away. It's more sensible at first to get to know everyone in your class and in your year.






WHO TO TALK TO

Everyone has times when they are anxious about something. In school there are plenty of people to turn to, so never feel that you have to struggle to deal with problems on your own. Sometimes you'll want to talk to your friends, or to an older pupil you have got to know and who will understand how you might be feeling. You will find out about the Sixth Form Mentoring Scheme when you join us. Your Form Tutor, one of your subject teachers, your Head of Section or Mrs Gilding-Brant will find a time to talk to you on your own, or you may wish to talk to Nurse Lan or Nurse Doel. You can also report a concern using Pupil Voice, which is an online form for you to fill in.

We understand that you may want to talk about some things in confidence, and not want them to be discussed with someone else. Members of staff will always respect this wish as far as possible but if, as a result of what you tell them, they think that you or someone else may be at risk, they must pass it on to Mrs Gilding-Brant, who is in charge of safeguarding. We have a trained counsellor who is available if you want to talk to someone different. Mrs Gilding-Brant can arrange an appointment for you.









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
